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Dear New Scholar,

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AFTER YOU CHECK WITH THE ISSS

Meet with your supervisor in your host department to become familiar with your work place. Complete any necessary paperwork with the personnel representative of the department.

Obtain your Binghamton University ID card. This is done a er you have checked in with your host department.

- x To arrange for your new Binghamton University ID card, go to the Admission Center, Room 112. The Student Records o ce is open daily from 9:00am 4:00pm.
- x Be sure to bring your appointment le er from your academic sponsor and your passport with you when you apply for the Binghamton University ID card. Your picture will be taken and you will be issued a card that day.
- x The ID card will allow you to set up your Binghamton University e-mail account and to use the services of the libraries at Binghamton University. Lost, stolen, or mullated ID cards can be replaced at the ID card o ce for a fee of \$20.

If you will be a paid employee of Binghamton University, you are eligible to apply for a Social Security Number (SSN). To apply for an SSN you will need the following documents:

- x Passport
- x Visa
- x DS-2019
- x I-94
- Employment le er on Binghamton University le erhead that includes: name, job tle, job descrip on, job start date, number of hours scholar will work per week, Employer Iden Eca on Number (EIN), Employer contact informa on, original signature, tle and date.

IMPORTANT FEDERAL REGULATIONS

During your J-1 program you are responsible for learning, understanding, and complying with U.S. federal laws and regula ons governing J-1 status. Failure to maintain your J-1 status can have serious long-term consequences for you. We are here to support and guide you through the complex maze of immigra on laws and are available to answer any ques ons you may have.

Your responsibili es include the following:

- x Keep your passport valid at all mes: You must have a valid passport in your possession. It must be valid at least 6 months into the future. For informa on on renewing your passport, visit the web site of your country's embassy or consulate in the United States.
- x Report address changes within 10 days to the ISSS: U.S. federal regula ons require all J-1 scholars to report a change of address or phone number directly to the ISSS within 10 days of the address change. You can update this informa on by emailing ISSS@binghamton.edu.
- x Incidental Employment: J-1 faculty and scholars may conduct research or teach only at Binghamton University unless specibcally authorized ahead of me by the ISSS to give a lecture or consult at another U.S. ins tu on. Scholars must contact the ISSS in advance if invited to speak or consult at another school, or a end a professional conference for which they receive reimbursement and/or an honorarium. THE HOME RESIDENCY REQUIREMENT AND BARS ON REPEAT PARTICIPATION

TWO-YEAR HOME RESIDENCY REQUIREMENT

Some exchange visitors with J-1 visas are subject to a two-year home country physical presence requirement, which requires you to return home for at least two years a er your exchange visitor program. This requirement is part of U.S. law, in the Immigra on and Na onality Act, Sec on 212(e). J-1 visa holders are subject if one or more of the following applies to them: AVe or more of the

The U.S. Department of State administers the Exchange Visitor Program under the provisions of the Mutual Educa onal and Cultural Exchange Act of 1961, as amended. The Act promotes mutual understanding between the people of the United States and other countries by means of educa onal and cultural exchange. The Exchange Visitor Program provides foreign na onals opportuni es to par cipate in exchange programs in the United States with the expecta on that on comple on of their exchange program, they will return home to share their experiences.

The U.S. Department of State has established a Compliance Unit to provide an informa onal resource to par cipants in J-1 Exchange Visitor Programs. It is managed directly by the Department of State. EXTENSIONS

Internal onal research scholars and faculty in J-1 status whose DS-2019 are due to expire and would like to apply for an extension must follow U.S. Department of State-Bureau of Educal on and Cultural Exchange procedures to extend their stay in the United States.

You must contact ISSS at least 30 days before your DS-2019 end date to request an extension. The actual request for your extension must come from your host department. If you submit all of the necessary documenta on requested

SAFETY ON CAMPUS AND IN THE COMMUNITY

The New York State University Police at Binghamton is a fully empowered state law enforcement agency. Our o cers receive their basic training at the Zone 6 Municipal Police Training Academy conducted at the Broome County Sheri 's Public Safety Facility in Binghamton, NY. Our o cers receive addi onal, on-going training addressing the needs of our campus environment.

Our primary mission is to provide a safe environment for the campus community. - x In case of an emergency: Call 607-777-2222 to reach University Police. If you are calling from an on-campus land line, call 7-2222 or dial 911. Sta answering this phone number will direct your call.
- x If you cannot remember the emergency number, you can always call 911 from a cell phone and be connected to Broome County Dispatch who can redirect your call to the University Police.
- x In case of a non-emergency (or) any other ma er, call 607-777-2393.
- x Blue Light Emergency Telephones: More than 80 highly visible outdoor phones encased in Blue boxes for emergency use are connected directly to the University Police Dispatcher.
- x Educa onal Programs: In addi on to the already men oned programs and services, the University Police o ers educa onal programs on issues including alcohol and other substance abuse, **P**re safety, other dimensions of personal safety and related topics.
- Escort Program: On-campus walking escorts are available to all members of the University community 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. O cers will also provide escort services at other mes. Escorts receive special training and carry radios for communica on with the Police.

PUBLIC SCHOOL DISTRICTS
